

Dear Friends,

Holy Week is soon upon us. We enter into it beginning on Palm Sunday, on April 10th.

Holy Week runs the gamut of human experience. We travel from the high joy experienced by Jesus on Palm Sunday, with shouts of *“Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!”*, to the horrid shouts of *“Crucify Him! We have no king but Caesar!”* directed to him on the following Friday. In between these two days, after instituting the Last Supper, we also see Jesus arrested and then brutally tortured. Given such turns of events—and given such displays of human cruelty—it is tempting to race ahead to Easter Sunday, to Jesus’ resurrection. To do so, however, can cause us to lose sight of what kept Jesus true to his mission—and what can also keep us true to God’s plan for our lives....

As I write this, the on-going war in Ukraine weighs heavily upon our hearts. This sudden—and unprovoked—unleashing of aggression in Europe continues to shock and even stupefy us. What can possibly be gained by Russia in doing this? To me, there are no logical answer to this question, at least when it comes to the average Russian citizen, not to mention the thousands of conscripted soldiers who have already died in this war. What is without question, I feel, is the incredible resilience of the Ukrainian people. Our 24/7 news reporting continues to show us their remarkable resilience and determination. They continue to endure the un-endurable.

How is this possible?

History tells us how, in the story of John Leonard Wilson:

In the summer of 1941, Leonard was appointed Bishop of Singapore, then part of the far-flung British Empire. He arrived before Imperial Japan attacked and captured the island, and, for a time, he was permitted to visit the prisoner-of-war camps established throughout the island.

In late 1943, this changed: Wilson was interned at the infamous Changi prison. Here, he joined over 3000 other prisoners of war in squalid conditions with an inadequate diet. On October 17, 1943, he was removed for the purpose of interrogation concerning an alleged spy ring. For three whole days he was questioned and tortured before being returned to Changi prison in a semi-conscious state, missing most of the flesh from his back, legs and feet.

How did he make it through this time of suffering and inhumanity?

In a sermon preached some three years later, he said:

"I remember Archbishop William Temple writing that if you pray for any particular virtue, whether it be patience or courage or love, one of the answers God gives you is an opportunity for exercising that virtue.

After my first beating, I was almost afraid to pray for courage, lest I should have another opportunity of exercising it, but my unspoken prayer was there, and without God's help I doubt whether I could have come through. Long hours of pain were a severe test. In the middle of that torture they asked me if I still believed in God. When, by God's help, I said, 'I do', they asked me why he did not save me, and by the help of his Holy Spirit, I said: 'God does save me. He does not save me by freeing me from the pain or punishment, but he saves me by giving me the spirit to bear it'.

And when they asked me why I did not curse them, I told them it was because I was a follower of Jesus Christ, who taught us that we were all brethren. I did not like to use the words, 'Father forgive them'. It seemed too blasphemous to use our Lord's words, but I felt them, and I said, 'Father, I know these men are doing their duty. Help them to see that I am innocent'. I then muttered, 'Father forgive them'.

I wondered how far I was being dramatic and if I really meant it, because as I looked at their faces as they stood around me and took turns in flogging me, I saw faces that were hard and cruel and some of them were evidently enjoying their cruelty. But by the grace of God I saw those men not as they were, but as they had been. Once they were little children playing with their brothers and sisters and happy in their parents' love, in those far off days before they had been conditioned by their false nationalist ideals, and it is hard to hate little children; but even that was not enough. There came into my mind, as I lay on the table, the words of that communion hymn,

*"Look, Father, look on his anointed face,
And only look on us as found in him;
Look not on our mis-usings of thy grace,
Our prayers so languid, and our faith so dim,
For lo! between our sins and their reward
We set the passion of thy Son our Lord."*

And so, I saw them not as they were, not as they had been, but as they were capable of becoming, redeemed by the power of Christ, and I knew it was only common sense to say, 'Forgive'."

I cannot read these words without thinking of what we are witnessing, in Eastern Europe 2022. The same pain, suffering, and inhumanity is found there.

But so, too, is the presence of God--the answer to the prayers of so many. I am convinced that God's presence is giving the strength we are seeing, writ large, in this besieged nation. This same strength, I pray, will not only see an end to this war, but also a future that can leave what needs to be past, truly past.

For this is what Jesus achieved for us, on Easter Sunday. Easter is God's "no" to the past, and to ultimate power of evil to dictate human history. It is also God's "yes" to the start of future that can, truly, be free from the past. And here's the proof: In the year 1947, after the end of World War Two, Bishop Wilson returned to Singapore. Here, he baptized and confirmed one of the guards who had tortured him.

God always sees what we are capable of becoming.

The Spirit works to bring the lost home.

Let us continue to pray for this horrible war to end.

Let us pray also that the Holy Spirit will continue to offer comfort to the afflicted—and to afflict the comfortable all for the glory of God!



One Call System

Thanks to advances in technology, there are more ways to stay in touch these days. One way is through a service called "One Call Now". Park Presbyterian has just retained this service.

"One Call Now" allows for immediate contact to be made to members and friends of Park via either text messages or voicemails. For now, we going to use voicemails to reach you. What will occasion a call from us? Too often, calls come to our phones that are, well, un-called for. Therefore, we will make use of this service only for sharing vital, time-sensitive, information, such as a change to a planned church activity, for instance, or in the event of the passing of an active church member, etc. The "One Call Now" platform also allows for calls to be made to groups within the church family, such as The Session and The Board of Deacons. The phone number we will be using is 1-877-698-3261. We suggest you program your phone not to flag it as a scam or spam call. For now, the voicemails will feature my voice, Eric or Bre Ann's voice.

I believe this new means of staying in touch will help to draw us all closer, one to another. We hope you will agree!

Resurrection Egg Hunt



Ukraine Refugee Support and Partnership

The Mission Commission is sending \$1000 to support the Ukraine Refugee project through the Synod of the Trinity which will match contributions up to \$24,000. Any individuals wanting to contribute send checks to Park Church marked Ukraine in the notes. We will forward it with the Mission contribution.

We have an opportunity to be part of a Refugee Resettlement Partnership with Undivided-in-Christ, a Beaver County group of churches who will support a family resettling in the area. They are working through Jewish Family and Community Services one of the formal organizations working with the U.S. government in this work. They need 30 total volunteers from Undivided-in-Christ congregations/organizations. This group will work together to come alongside one family for a calendar year as they settle into their new home in the region. For more information, please contact the church office.
